GOSPEL

Matthew 2:13-15, 19-23

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

After the wise men had left, the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother with you, and escape into Egypt, and stay there until I tell you, because Herod intends to search for the child and do away with him.' So Joseph got up and, taking the child and his mother with him, left that night for Egypt, where he stayed until Herod was dead. This was to fulfil what the Lord had spoken through the prophet: I called my son out of Egypt.

After Herod's death, the angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother with you and go back to the land of Israel, for those who wanted to kill the child are dead.' So Joseph got up and, taking the child and his mother with him, went back to the land of Israel. But when he learnt that Archelaus had succeeded his father Herod as ruler of Judaea he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he left for the region of Galilee. There he settled in a town called Nazareth. In this way the words spoken through the prophets were to be fulfilled: 'He will be called a Nazarene.'



THE WORD

Year A • 28 December 2025 • Colour: White • Psalter Week 1



In today's Gospel, we witness the Holy Family's urgent flight into Egypt, escaping King Herod's deadly plan. Joseph's obedience to the angel's warning saves Jesus' life, highlighting God's protective care even amid danger.

This passage reminds us that faith often calls us to trust and act quickly, even when the future is uncertain. Joseph doesn't hesitate; he rises in the night to protect his family. Like him, we are invited to respond promptly to God's call, especially when it challenges our comfort or safety.

Herod's cruelty contrasts sharply with the gentle care of Mary and Joseph. Their journey into exile mirrors the struggles many endure—displacement, fear, and uncertainty. Yet, God's providence is clear: Jesus, the promised Messiah, is preserved to bring salvation.

The return from Egypt also fulfills ancient prophecy, reminding us that God's plan is unfolding, even through hardship.

As we reflect on this passage, let us ask ourselves: Are we ready to trust God's guidance in difficult moments? Can we, like Joseph and Mary, find courage and hope in uncertain times?

May this story encourage us to place our trust in God's loving protection, knowing that no matter what dangers surround us, God's plan for our life will never fail. ■



LEARN

St. Joseph, called the guardian of Jesus and the Church, teaches us the power of quiet faith and obedience. His prompt trust in God's call saved the Holy Family. The Church invites all families to follow this example—embracing challenges with patience and faith, trusting God's loving plan.

REFLECT

oday, on the Feast of the Holy Family, we reflect on the journey of Mary, Joseph, and Jesus—a family like no other, yet one who faced real struggles, fears, and uncertainties. In the Gospel, Joseph receives an urgent call from God to flee into Egypt to protect the child Jesus. Without hesitation, he rises and acts to keep his family safe.

This reminds us that faith is not always easy or comfortable. Sometimes, like Joseph, we are asked to trust and move forward into the unknown, even when we feel afraid. But the Holy Family shows us that in those moments, God's love and protection are with us, guiding each step.

Their journey was difficult—leaving home, stepping into unfamiliar lands—but it was through their courage and trust that God's plan was fulfilled. As we celebrate this feast, we remember that every family, in its joys and challenges, can find strength in God's presence.

So today, let us hold up the Holy Family as a model. Whether our families are perfect or struggling, may we follow Joseph's example—responding with faith, love, and courage. And may God's gentle care be with all our families, guiding us through every challenge and blessing us with hope.
